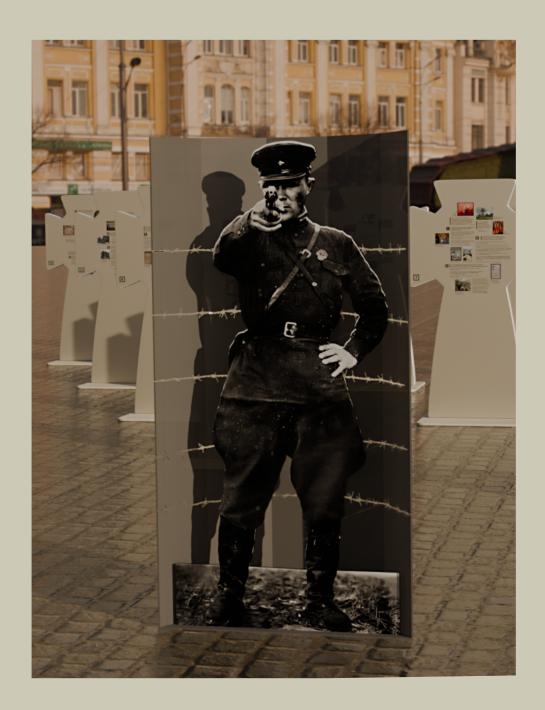
EXTERMINATION WAR

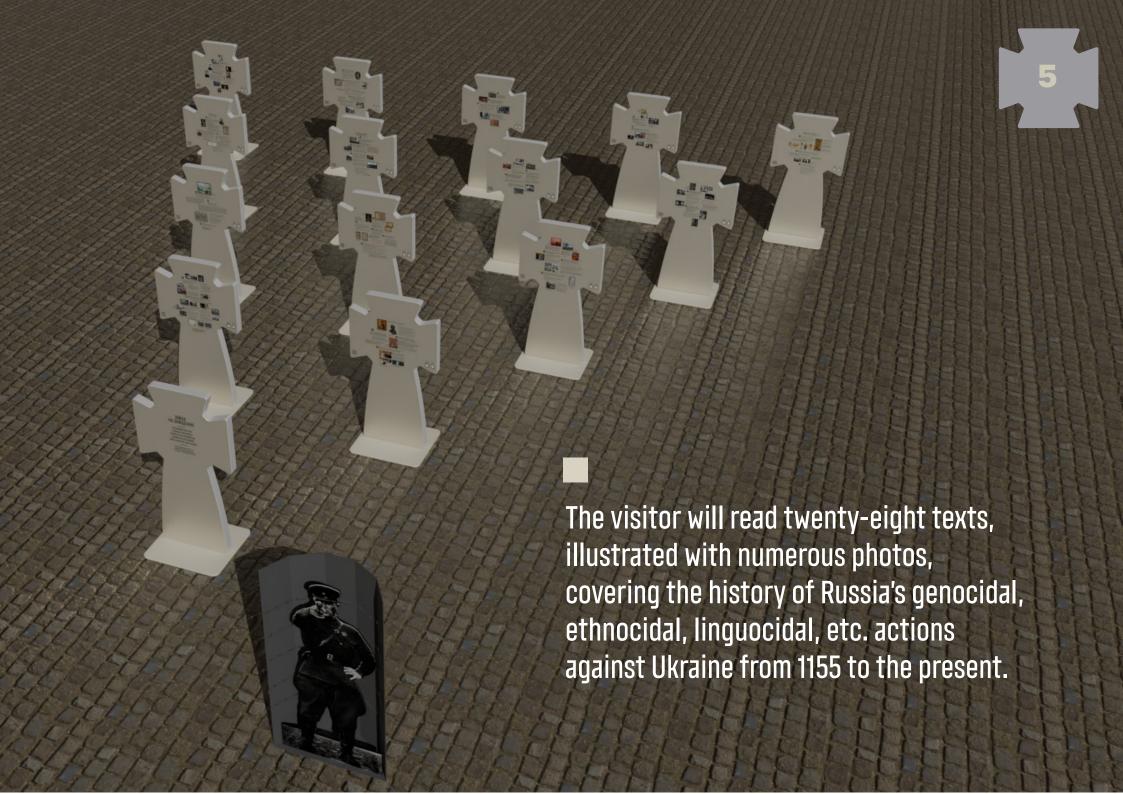
Russia (Moscovy until 1721)

The goal of the street exhibition "Extermination War" is to convey to the general public, through a combination of historical facts and visual effects, that Russia, under various names, has been destroying Ukraine, Ukrainians and Ukrainian identity throughout its centuries-long history, not just since the beginning of the full-scale invasion.



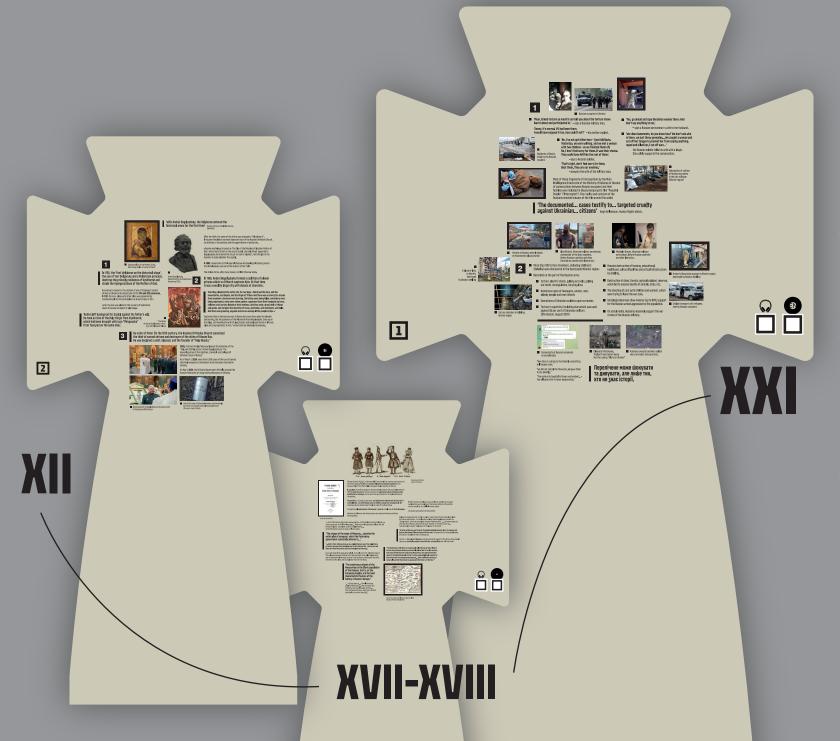


The visual idea is that behind the figure of the Russian executioner in the quise of an NKVD officer, the visitor sees a symbolic image of the cemetery of millions of Ukrainian victims destroyed by the Russians. The main figure of the exhibition is a reflection of the traditional cross of Cossack burials and has a colour close to grey sandstone – the traditional material from which the crosses were made.









The texts cover all aspects of this terrible phenomenon. The facts are also presented to show that the main narratives and falsifications of Moscow propaganda, which are the basis for the aggressor to justify its own actions and cultural expansion in the world, have remained unchanged since the beginning of history.

Vyshgorod Icon of the Mother of God. After being stolen, it is kept in the RF

In 1155, the 'first Velykoros on the historical stage', the son of Yuri Dolgoruky and a Polovtsian princess, destroys the princely residence of Vyshhorod and steals the Vyshgorod Icon of the Mother of God.

According to research, the creation of one of the largest sacred shrines in Ukraine - Rus dates back to the 11th and 12th centuries. In 1131, the icon, along with other relics was presented by Constantinople to Prince Mstvslav the Great of Kviv in 1131.

Later, the icon was placed in the nunnery of Vyshhorod, where it became an object of pilgrimage.

'Andrei left Vyshgorod for Suzdal against his father's will. He took an icon of the Holy Virgin from Vyshhorod, which had been brought with icon "Pirogoscha" of Andrei Bogolyubsky in Rus'" from Tsargrad on the same ship.'

After the theft, the name of the shrine was changed to "Volodymyr's". It became the oldest and most important icon of the Russian Orthodox Church, an attribute of coronations and the appointment of patriarchs.

Russian mythology is based on 'the Tale of the Miracles of Vladimir Mother of God', which reports that on the way to Suzdal, the Holy Virgin 'appeared to Bogolyubsky and ordered him to put an icon in Vladimir'. And this led to the decision to make Vladimir the capital.

In 1895, researchers at the Imperial Moscow Archaeological Society proved that Boholyubsky was one of the authors of the 'Tale'.

The stolen shrine, after many moves, is still in Moscow today.

In 1169, Andrei Bogolyubsky formed a coalition of eleven princes which on 8 March captures Kyiv. At that time, it was a wealthy large city with dozen's of churches.

And they plundered the entire city for two days - Podil, and the Hora, and the monasteries, and Sophia, and the Virgin of Tithes. And there was no mercy for anyone from anywhere: churches were burning, Christians were being killed, and others were being imprisoned, wives were taken captive, separated from their husbands by force, children cried as they looked at their mothers. And they took a great deal of things and goods, and stripped the churches of icons, and books, and vestments, and bells. And there was groaning, anguish and sorrow among all the people in Kyiv...'

Captured cities in internecine wars in Russia had never been given for plunder and burning. But the grandson of the Polovtsian Khan Bogolyubsky "grew up on the Volga, and Rus-Ukraine with its long history and developed forms of life was alien and unsympathetic to him," wrote historian Mykhailo Hrushevsky.

By order of Peter I in the 18th century, the Russian Orthodox Church canonized the thief of sacred shrines and destroyer of the cities of Kievan Rus. He was declared a saint, blessed, and the founder of "Holy Russia."

160 years before 24.02.22, in February **1869**, French politician, senator and secretary of the French Geographical Society, **Casimir Delamarre presented a petition** in the Senate entitled "The Fifteen Million European People Forgotten in History."

Its goal was (by making changes to the educational program that were implemented in 1870) to open the eyes of French society to the aggressive nature of Russia and its substitution of concepts, this is one of the key moments in the implementation of the petition.

The petition, in its essence and name, was dedicated to Ukraine and the fact that it is actually Rus', to which Moscovy has no relation, except for occupation. It also contained serious doubts about the Slavic origin of the Moscovites.

The petition called Ukrainians "Ruthenians", which is actually one of their old names.

Mentions of Delamarre and this document were banned in Russian and Soviet historiography.

"... in the 13th century. Moscovites were... pagans... of the Muslim and Jewish religions, ... did not speak any of the Slavic languages... [Moscovy] only adopted the dialect with the Christian religion, which later came to be called Rus/Kyi. ... So the Moscovites are by no means of Slavic origin."

"The change of the name of Moscovy... contains the entire plan of conquest, which the Petersburg government constantly adheres to..."

"... before Peter I those whom we now call Ruthenians were then called Rusy or Rus'ky, because their homeland was the Rus' land or Rus', and the current Rusy were then Moscovites and their homeland was Moscovy.

Even under Peter I, the geographer Delisle, in his atlas from 1721, called the state of this ruler. the Moscow stardom. Later, Moscow began to be called Velykorossia, and its inhabitants Velykorossy, because it was necessary to distinguish this state from the true Rus. Iand. and its nobulation from the true Rus.

"The continuous attacks of the Moscovites on the Slavic population of the Dnieper, that is, on the European peoples, are the most characteristic feature of the history of Eastern Europe."

"... in Europe there is... a 15-million-strong people of Ruthenians,... they have their own traditions, their own language, distinct... from the Moscovite one,... they have a distinct individuality for which they fight."

In 1991, Ukrainian translator, poet, and literary scholar Taras Luchuk published his own translation of the German edition of the petition and the article but it is still little known today.

Key theses and quotes from the petition:

Delamarre emphasizes that, firstly, in a place "where three Finnish nationalities lived: Ves, Menya and wroma", Yuri Dolgoruly and later Andrei Bogolyubsky created the "Suzdal region", which was much later renamed "Moskovschina","... the name comes not from the city of Moscow, but from the word "moksha" or "motsha", which in... Turanian dialects means "Settlement of the leader of the horde" is

"As soon as Moscovy was formed, its goal immediately became clear: to conquer and destroy the Dnieper Slavs and move further west," because the first thing Bogolyubsky did was burn and plunder Kyiv and Novgorod.

Further, "... the rulers of Moscovy, having secured the support of the Tatars, whose vassals they were, constantly sought to seize the Rus' principalities and rule over them."

"The Ruthenians (only they were previously called Rus'ky or Rusy) lived in the territory between Moscovy and actually Poland but in the last century they were defeated by the conquering Moscovites, who appropriated the name of the defeated people in order to have supposedly legal grounds for their entry into the conquered possessions... Such a deliberate mixing ammas allowed the Moscovites to appropriate the history of the Rus !"

Most of these fragments of interceptions by the Main Intelligence Directorate of the Ministry of Defense of Ukraine of conversations between Russian occupiers and their families were included in Oksana Karpovych's film "Peaceful People" ("Intercepted"). 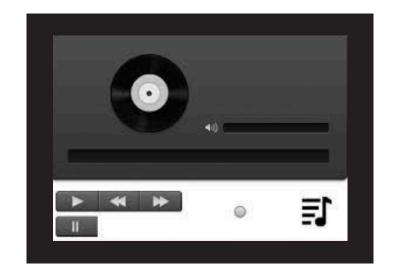






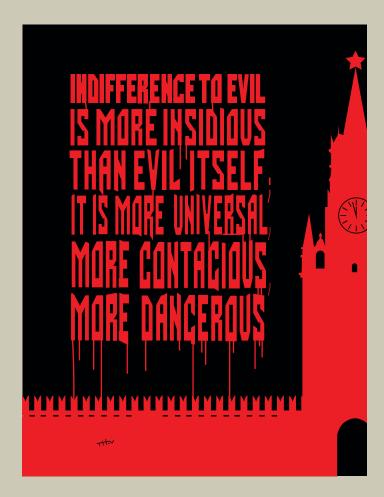






- To improve the perception of information, each text can be listened to in a professional acting performance using a unique QR code on the project website, where all photos and texts will also be available.

In these circumstances, it is crucial³ to understand the historical context and the true nature of the aggressor



















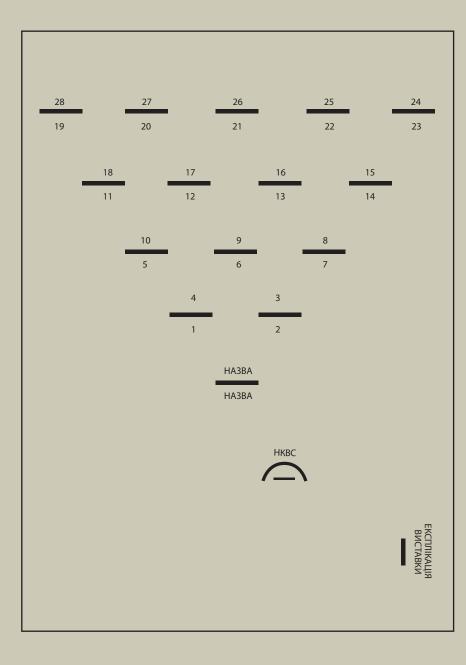






All structures are manufactured at the industrial base of one of the domestic metalworking leaders "Metalworkshop" from high-quality steel and painted using the electrostatic powder coating method, which ensures long-term protected outdoor use. The texts and photos are printed using ultraviolet printing, which ensures colour preservation.

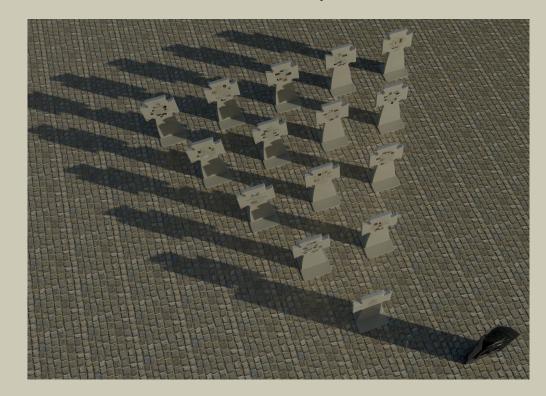
The manufacturer provides delivery and professional installation of the exhibit with reliable and safe fastening to any surface with mechanical or chemical anchors in accordance with the conditions, as well as approvals and permits from the authorities.

The project involves replicating and installing the exhibition in the most visited places of Ukrainian cities and other settlements, as well as abroad (using the language of the country of location as the main one).

For a comfortable distance between the exhibition structures (2 meters in a row and on the side and 2.5 meters between rows), an area with minimum dimensions of 15x20 meters is required.



The author of the idea of the exhibition, the appearance of each of the structures, all the texts and the selection of photos for them is **Leonid Bragin** (a native of Kharkiv, the author of the cultural and historical channel "Faino! Ukrainian Cultural Front", temporarily residing in Lviv since March 2022).
